## **Industry Update: Uncertainty continues from China countervailing investigation against Australian Barley**

**18th December 2019**

### **Key Messages:**

- China's countervailing investigation against the Australian barley industry is continuing and the potential outcomes remain uncertain.
- Australian growers should be aware of this market risk as they finalise harvest and move onto next year's planting period

The Australian barley industry has expressed concern with the announcement by the People's Republic of China, extending its countervailing investigation into Australian barley exports to China.

Under the WTO process, countervailing investigations can be extended for a further 6 months beyond the initial 12 months of the investigation. China has indicated the countervailing investigation will now be finalised on 21<sup>st</sup> June 2020.

The People's Republic of China initiated a countervailing investigation regarding Australian barley exports in December 2018. The World Trade Organisation definition of countervailing is when a foreign country subsidises its exports, which results in 'injury' to the importing country's domestic production.

Though the Australian grain industry and Australian Government are confident that subsidies have not been provided to Australian barley growers, the likely outcome of this investigation is unknown at this point in time. Possible outcomes could include the imposition of provisional import tariff/duties on Australian barley exports to China. Australian growers should be aware of this market risk as they finalise harvest and move onto next year's planting period.

China is Australia's largest barley export market and Australia is the largest supplier of barley to China. Along with the related Anti-Dumping investigation, this investigation has created uncertainty within the Australian grain market, that has resulted in downward pressure on Australian barley prices.

The Australian barley industry continues to access and develop new markets like Thailand and Indonesia to ensure Australia has a diverse range of customers for both malt and feed barley. This is in addition to our long-standing and valued barley customers in China and Japan.

The organisations making this statement; Grain Trade Australia, Grains Industry Market Access Forum, Australian Grain Exporters Council, GrainGrowers Limited and Grain Producers Australia fully respect China's right to conduct these investigations under WTO rules and have cooperated fully with China's investigation and the WTO process.

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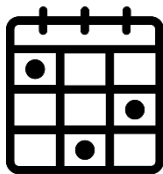
## Fact sheet for Australian grain growers



### Overview

Australian grain growers should be aware of uncertainty and disruption in the market for Australian barley if the Chinese Ministry of Commerce (MOFCOM) imposes provisional import tariff/duties on barley imported from Australia.

China is Australia's largest export market for malting and feed barley.



### Key dates

November 2018 – China initiates anti-dumping investigation into Australian barley

December 2018 – China announces 'countervailing' investigation against Australian barley imports

January 2019 – Response provided by Australian exporters and grains industry bodies

March 2019 – Australian industry awaiting the outcome of the anti-dumping investigation

November 2019 – MOFCOM announces 6-month extension of the deadline for the anti-dumping investigation

December 2019 - MOFCOM announces 6-month extension of the deadline for the countervailing investigation



### 2019 harvest and longer term

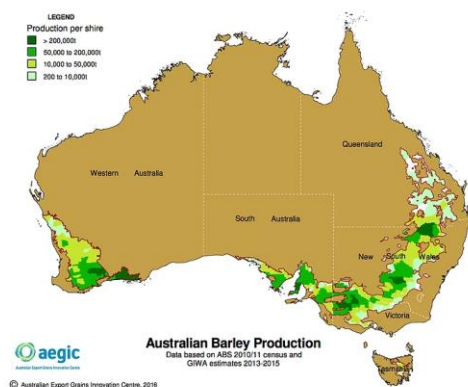
MOFCOM's investigations and potential to apply provisional measures may have impacts on market opportunities for Australian barley this harvest.

Australian growers considering planting barley for the 2019 season are encouraged to be aware of these issues in coming months as they move closer to finalising their cropping plans for the year.

Investigations and duties could be in place for 12 months or more.

### Key facts

- China has been Australia’s largest export marketing for malting barley for decades and in more recent years, Australia’s feed barley
- Australia’s research and malting barley breeding has been developed in cooperation with China’s malting & brewing industry
- If provisional measures are imposed as part of an anti-dumping investigation Australian barley may become uncompetitive in China.
